Families seek out Centreville Layton School for its well-rounded program that combines academic and recreational opportunities.

The Centreville Layton School Summer Program serves boys and girls from K through 8th grade and prides itself on focusing on the individual needs and strengths of each student. Our balanced program offers a structured academic morning program and a recreation afternoon program. Through our hands-on, multisensory approach, your child will grow and prosper.

Academic Morning Program

Our academic program is designed to review, enhance, and enrich academic skills so that students are prepared to start a new school year in the fall. The focus in the morning is on reading, written language, and math. Students will spend approximately 50 minutes on each subject with a break and snack time built into the day.

Centreville Layton School prides itself on small class sizes, so each student receives the attention they need. The program runs five days a week, from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm. Language Therapy and Occupational Therapy are available for those that qualify.

Literacy

Daily language arts instruction reinforces decoding skills, oral reading fluency, and comprehension. Literary skills are also taught, including identifying the author's purpose; sequencing story events; using context clues to make inferences; and identifying story elements like setting, plot, characters, and theme. Students read selections from anthologies, trade books, novels, and then demonstrate comprehension through discussion, activities, and written responses.

Written language is taught each day during language arts class. Students write in various genres and learn organizational skills that can be applied to all types of writing. The youngest students begin by drawing a picture and writing a sentence to describe it; the oldest students write complex responses to reading comprehension questions as well as multi-paragraph pieces. Proofreading, revising, and editing skills are refined.

Mathematics

Daily mathematics instruction reviews grade-level concepts from the previous school year and will explore concepts that will be introduced in the fall. Facts, computation, and problem-solving skills are a few of the concepts that may be taught. This provides all students with a jumpstart and added confidence when they enter the next grade level.

Academic Learning Skills

Academic learning skills are reinforced throughout the morning. Specifically, students are taught organization skills and study strategies appropriate for their grade level. Developing these skills helps students confidently begin the new school year.

Communication

Strong communication with the current teacher and summer teacher is integral in the planning of each student's program for the five weeks. In addition to the information we receive from the current teacher, our staff assesses each student's skills using diagnostic teaching strategies. This enables teachers to design a more individualized program to meet the student's unique needs. At the end of the summer program, parents receive a written report about their child's progress, including a summary of their child's individual strengths and areas that need continued reinforcement.

Therapies

Occupational Therapy

Occupational Therapy is offered by a licensed registered occupational therapist. Lower School students are typically seen in the mini-gym one to two times a week in a small group (two to four children) for a thirty-minute session. Middle School students are typically seen once a week in a small group (two to four students) for a thirty-minute session. Occupational Therapy services are designed to reinforce the goals that have been established by the child's IEP or goals from a private occupational therapist. Assistive technology tools to support written output production are introduced as indicated or as needed.

To receive Occupational Therapy, a student must:

- Have received occupational therapy services within the present calendar year.
- Qualify for therapy intervention based on a current school Individual Educational Plan (IEP), recent Occupational Therapy Evaluation, or current Occupational Therapy progress or update note from the treating occupational therapist.

Speech and Language Therapy

During Centreville Layton School's Summer Program, Speech and Language Therapy is designed to reinforce school year achievements and to advance student progress towards existing goals regarding articulation, receptive and expressive language, pragmatic language, and other school-related communication skill areas. Summer goals, as well as the frequency of service, are developed based on one of the documents listed below and at the discretion of the Speech/Language Pathologist. All therapies are delivered by State Licensed and Nationally Certified Speech/Language Pathologists.

To receive summer Language Therapy, one or more of the following types of documentation must be provided by the parent:

- Recent speech and language evaluation (no more than two years old)
- Current I.E.P. with speech or language goals
- Language therapy progress summary

Morning Care

Morning Care is offered with two options. Families may opt to prepay for all 5-weeks or may pay per attendance. Students may enter the gym beginning at 7:30 am to play under teacher supervision. If a student is dropped off before 8:10 am, a Morning Care charge will be applied.

Recreational Afternoon Program

After a morning spent learning, students become campers and participate in a structured afternoon recreational program. A Centreville Layton School veteran teacher runs the afternoon program. A staff of teachers and counselors work with the campers to ensure a fun camp experience. Groups are limited to 10-12 campers, so all children receive the attention they need.

Staff

Supporting the afternoon is a team of Centreville Layton School's own teachers as well as counselors from local colleges and high schools. Many of these counselors have been part of Centreville Layton School's Summer Program for several summers. As part of the hiring process, counselors must complete a volunteer summer in which they work alongside an experienced counselor.

Centreville Layton School counselors:

- Exhibit good character, healthy habits, and integrity
- Desire to work with children
- Are enthusiastic
- Are emotionally mature and demonstrate sound judgment and self-control

Nurse

The safety of our students and campers is very important to us. Our school nurse is on campus all day. She takes part in all off-campus activities, including any field trips.

Lunch/Snack

Lunch

Upon dismissal, campers gather in the gym and find seats for lunch. Campers should bring their lunch from home. Students are not permitted to use the microwave.

Snack

Mid-way through the afternoon, campers will be offered a snack. On days when we are on-campus this usually consists of a bagged treat (chips, pretzels, etc.).

Allergies

All known allergies are respected and we do our best to inform parents of the snack options and alternatives. It is suggested that campers with allergies bring food from home for safety. Please talk to the nurse about any concerns.

Afternoon Activities

Our afternoon session provides an opportunity for children to strengthen their social and physical skills. Three days each week the campers participate in; on campus scheduled activities such as physical games, arts and crafts, or science. The other two days a week, all campers will enjoy time at the Skyline Swim Club in Pike Creek.

Physical Games

Physical Games at Centreville Layton School's Summer Program focus on moving and having fun.Our large, air-conditioned gymnasium and sprawling campus offer ample space to accommodate a variety of indoor and outdoor activities. Campers learn the basic rules and skills of various games or sports.

Arts and Crafts

Led by an enthusiastic teacher and counselor, campers enjoy creating and exploring many mediums. Imaginations and ideas are sparked from the famous Perler beads to construction paper projects. This could include some cooking lessons as well. Activities may center on the theme or just summer creations.

Fun Frenzy Days

One day a week is usually considered our Fun Frenzy Day. In the past, the inflatables (moon bounces) has been one of the campers favorite days. We usually end the Summer Program with a Fun Frenzy Day consisting of water games such as water balloons, sprinkler, and more.

2026 Summer Program Application Process

Please be sure the following information is included with your child's application. If we are missing information, we will not be able to process the application.

Step One: Application

- □ Completed Application (enclosed) and \$75.00 nonrefundable application fee, made payable to Centreville Layton School by May 16, 2026
- □ Completed Teacher Report Form (enclosed)
 - Please ask your child's teacher to complete this form and mail it to the attention of Meghan Kivler at Centreville Layton School.
- □ A copy of your child's most recent report card
- ☐ A copy of your child's most recent Psychological/Educational Evaluation (if applicable)
- □ A copy of your child's most recent Occupational Therapy and/or Language Therapy Evaluation (Unfortunately we cannot provide these services without an evaluation on file)
- □ Please address all applications, registration forms, and paperwork to the attention of Angela Gilbert at the address below.

Step Two: Acceptance

- □ After careful review of your child's application by the Admissions Committee, you will receive confirmation in writing and by phone of acceptance or denial into the Summer Program. Should we need further information about your child, we will contact you.
- □ Upon your child's acceptance, you will receive a packet with a contract and information required to complete your child's enrollment. Please fill out the documents included in this packet and return them with your deposit.
- □ A deposit of \$500.00 is required at the time of acceptance. This deposit will secure a spot for your child and will be applied to summer tuition.

Step Three: Finalizing Enrollment

- □ Final payment is due by June 2, 2026.
- ☐ If payment is not made in full by this time, your child's spot cannot be guaranteed. A late fee of 12% APR on any outstanding balance will be charged after a five-day grace period.
